SUGGESTED BACKGROUND KNOWLEDGE

In order to feel comfortable with this course, it is recommended that students are already familiar with the fundamentals of Private Law and Public Law.

MISSION

Students are expected to gain a working knowledge of the main features of foreign and uniform private law and to get significantly acquainted with the principles of European private law. They should acquire the ability of assessing costs and benefits in applying foreign and uniform law and the principles of European law, compared to domestic law. Module 1 (general part) is aimed to depict the cultural and historical background of the Western legal tradition, as well as to illustrate the goals and methodology of comparative law. The concept and content of a 'common core' of European law will be discussed on the basis of the 'principles' that have been collected to enshrine it; heed will be paid also to the projects of a European civil code. The sources of uniform private law will be covered, particularly the UNIDROIT Principles of International Commercial Contracts (PICC) and the Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods (CISG). Module 2 (special part) is aimed to carry out a comparative



analysis of the main institutes of private law, with a specific focus on contract, tort and unjustified enrichment.

ATTENDING STUDENTS

- Attending students must take two partial exams: partial and end-of-semester. Each of them will consist of 25 multiple-choice questions and 2 open-ended questions. For each multiple-choice question, four possible answers will be suggested, only one of them being the right one. Each right answer will be awarded 1/30 point; no penalty for wrong or missing answers will be given. Answers to open-ended questions will be evaluated up to 3/30 points each.
 - The program of each partial exams for attending students will be comunicated in class.
 - The registered grade will be the average between the grades of the two partial exams. The average may be increased up to 3/30 points for group assignments.
 - Students failing to pass either of the two partial exams, will have to take a
 general exam, consisting of 25 multiple-choice questions and 2 open-ended
 questions. For each multiple-choice question, four possible answers will be
 suggested, only one of them being the right one. Each right answer will be
 awarded 1/30 point; no penalty for wrong or missing answers will be given.
 Answers to open-ended questions will be evaluated up to 3/30 points each.
 - The program of the general exam for attending students is indicated in the section on teaching materials for attending students (see below). Exams are purported to verify that students have achieved a certain knowledge of: the general principles and rules applicable to the most important branches of private



law; the main differences between civil law and common law of contract, tort, and unjust enrichment; the relevant issues related to international contracts; and the impact that legal rules can produce in the market and on the behavior of businesses and consumers.

 Group assignments are purported to verify that students have achieved the necessary skills and abilities to: use the terminology of civil and common law; assess legal rules from a social and economic point of view; and draw up a document dealing with legal issues and to present it orally.

NON-ATTENDING STUDENTS

- Non-attending students must take two partial exams: partial and end-of-semester. Each of them will consist of 25 multiple-choice questions and 2 open-ended questions. For each multiple-choice question, four possible answers will be suggested, only one of them being the right one. Each right answer will be awarded 1/30 point; no penalty for wrong or missing answers will be given. Answers to open-ended questions will be evaluated up to 3/30 points each. The registered grade will be the average between the grades of the two partial exams.

- Students failing to pass either of the two partial exams will have to take a general exam, consisting of 25 multiple-choice questions and 2 open-ended questions. For each multiple-choice question, four possible answers will be suggested, only one of them being the right one. Each right answer will be awarded 1/30 point; no penalty for wrong or missing answers will be given. Answers to open-ended questions will be evaluated up to 3/30 points each.
